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WHAT TO DO THIS WEEK

Five small actions you can take in under an hour each

- 1. Test your home weather alerting today.** If you live in western Texas, thunderstorms with large hail and damaging wind gusts up to 75 mph are possible this afternoon into the evening. Confirm Wireless Emergency Alerts are ON in your phone settings. Download the [FEMA App](#) if you do not have it. If you have a [NOAA Weather Radio](#) receiver, test it now -- and note that the Rio Grande City and Rockport, Texas transmitters are out of service in or near the storm zone.
- 2. Secure loose items outside and know where you will shelter.** Damaging winds can turn patio furniture, trash cans, and garden items into hazards. Bring them in or tie them down before this afternoon. Identify an interior room on the lowest floor, away from windows, in case a severe storm moves through.
- 3. Fill the gas tank if it is low.** Gas prices are easing, around 4.39 dollars per gallon nationally. US and Iranian negotiators have reached a draft 60-day agreement that is waiting on President Trump to sign, though Iran fired a missile at Kuwait overnight that was shot down. A signed deal would help prices; more fighting would push them up. Topping off this week is a low-cost hedge either way.
- 4. Refresh your phone's offline maps.** If a storm cuts cell service, you want maps cached. [Google Maps](#) lets you download a region for offline use; do this from a wifi connection.
- 5. Check your software updates this week.** If your business or home office uses a website hosted on a cPanel server, ask your IT vendor or host to confirm the LiteSpeed plugin is on the latest security patch -- the federal patch deadline for that serious flaw is today, 29 May. Keep your home devices (phones, laptops, router) on automatic updates.

THIS WEEK'S ONE THING

IF YOU ONLY DO ONE THING THIS WEEK:

Verify your phone Wireless Emergency Alerts are turned ON.

Thunderstorms with large hail and damaging wind gusts up to 75 mph are forecast for western Texas this afternoon into the evening. [NOAA Weather Radio](#) is offline or degraded in 17 states, including the Rio Grande City and Rockport, Texas transmitters (out of service) in or near the storm zone.

THE SHORT VERSION

What's happening this week, in five sentences:

1. US and Iranian negotiators have reached a draft 60-day agreement that would extend the current ceasefire, open nuclear talks, and set a path to lifting the US blockade and reopening the Strait of Hormuz to shipping. It is waiting on President Trump to give final approval and is not signed yet. At the same time, Iran fired a missile at Kuwait overnight that Kuwaiti forces shot down, with no US base hit, and the US shot down several Iranian drones. The situation is unresolved, with both a renewed risk of fighting and a possible deal on the table at once.
2. Severe weather today is focused on western Texas: thunderstorms this afternoon into the evening with large hail and damaging wind gusts up to 75 mph. More isolated storms are possible across the central High Plains, southern Utah, and the northern Rockies. A separate critical fire-weather and dry-thunderstorm threat covers the Colorado Plateau and Southwest.
3. Gas prices are easing, around 4.39 dollars per gallon nationally, continuing the post-holiday decline. A signed US-Iran agreement that reopens the Strait of Hormuz would likely ease prices further; a breakdown would push them up.
4. There is one cyber item to act on: a serious flaw in the LiteSpeed cPanel website plugin has a federal patch deadline of today, 29 May. If your business or home office runs a website on a cPanel host, ask your IT vendor to confirm it is patched.
5. There is an Ebola outbreak in Central Africa (the Democratic Republic of the Congo and Uganda) that the World Health Organization has declared an international emergency. The outbreak in Africa is still growing, but there was no new case outside the region this week. There are **no US cases**, and the [CDC](#) assesses the risk to the US public as low. US airport entry screening is running at Washington-Dulles.

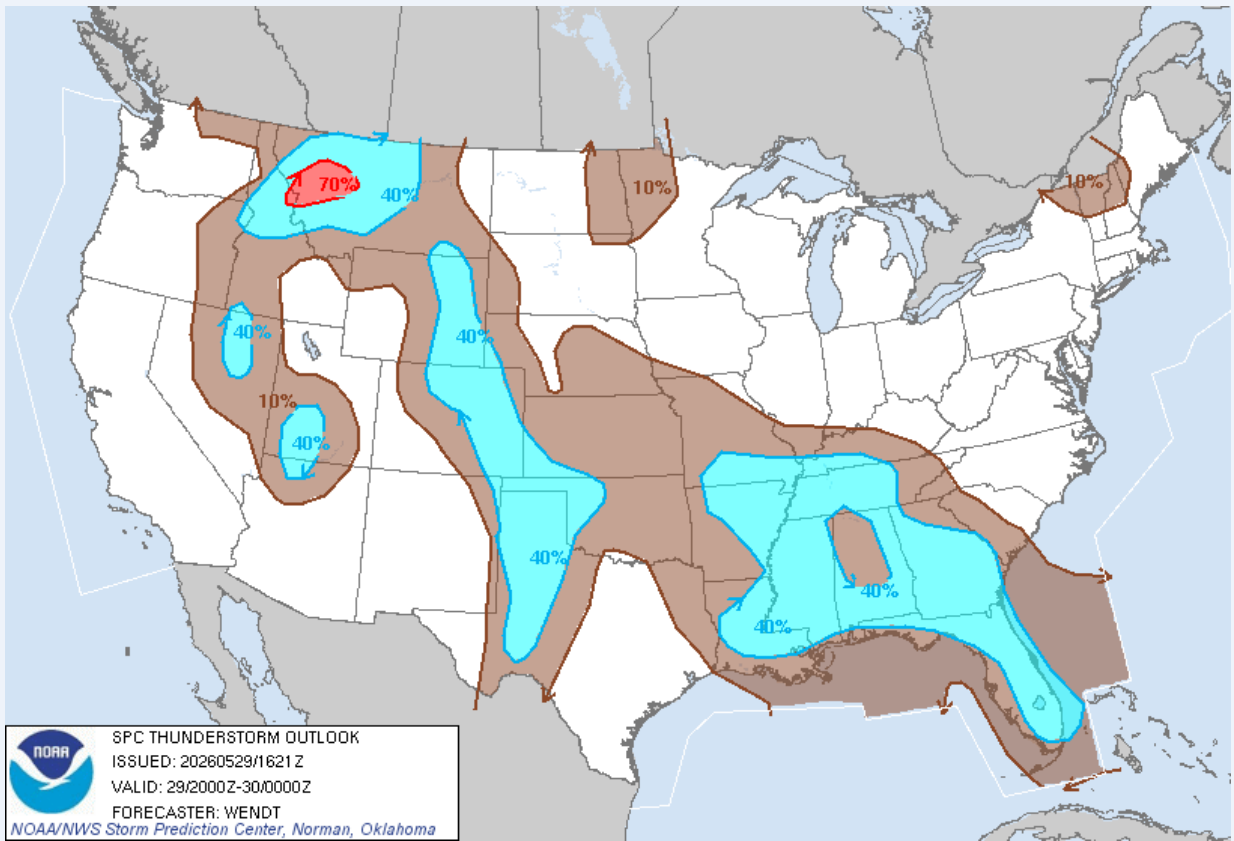
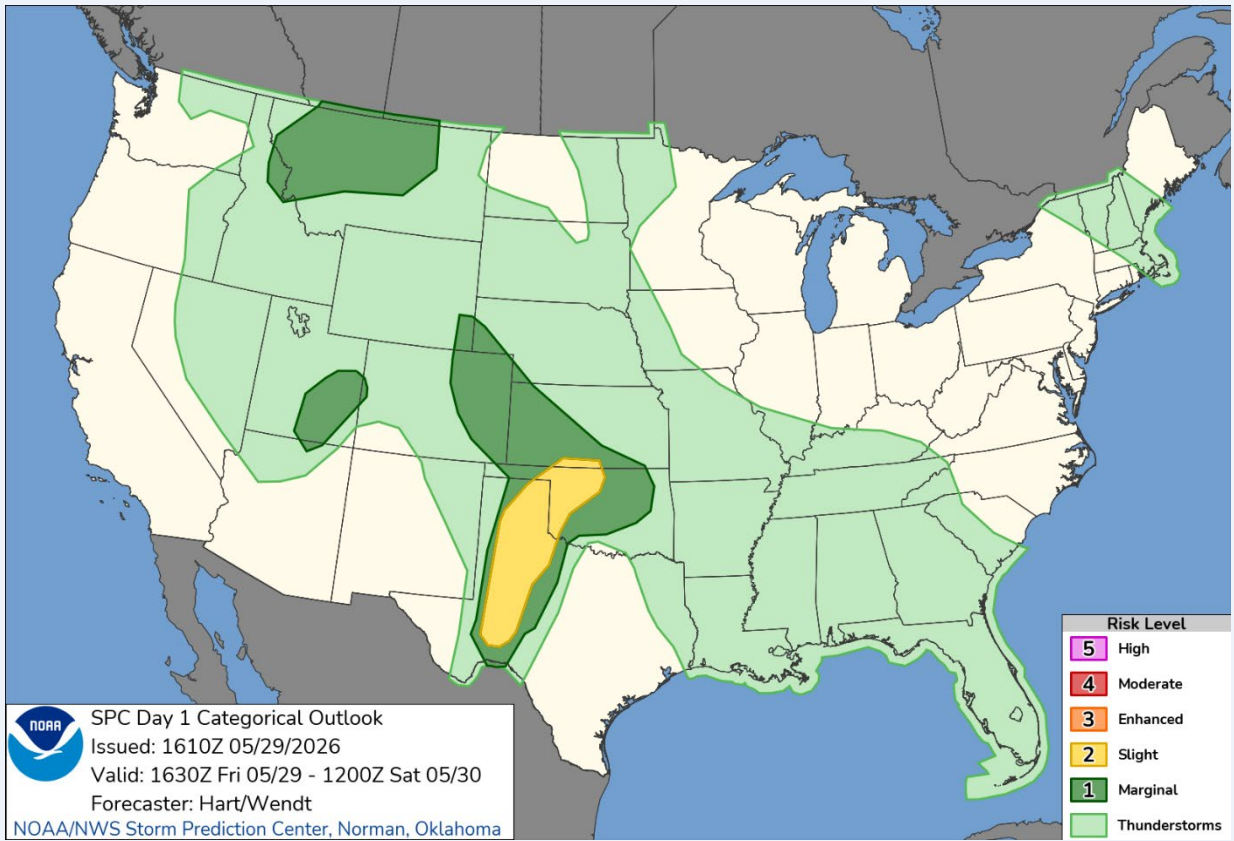

Food / Groceries	Stable. USDA next crop report June 11. No current-week change.	No urgent action.
Communications	NOAA Weather Radio : 31 transmitters affected across 17 states. The gaps nearest this week's weather are Rio Grande City and Rockport, Texas (both out of service, in or near the storm zone).	Use phone Wireless Emergency Alerts + FEMA App.
Public Health	Ebola outbreak in DR Congo and Uganda; WHO international emergency. No new case outside the region this week; the outbreak in Africa is still growing. No US cases ; CDC assesses US public risk as low. Airport entry screening is operational at Washington-Dulles.	No household action. Travelers to the region: check CDC guidance.
GPS / Internet	This week's minor solar radiation storm has ended; only a small geomagnetic disturbance remains. Brief radio static is possible on far-north flight routes. No effect on home GPS, phones, or internet.	No action needed.

WEATHER - WHERE IT MATTERS THIS WEEK

REGION	HAZARD	WHAT TO DO
Western Texas	Slight Risk severe storms today across portions of western Texas: large hail and damaging wind gusts up to 75 mph this afternoon into the evening, plus a critical fire-weather threat across the Colorado Plateau and Southwest.	Bring in or tie down loose outdoor items; phone alerts ON; identify your interior shelter room.
East-central Colorado	A separate hail threat along the Palmer Divide into north-central Colorado this afternoon, with large hail possible in stronger storms.	Park vehicles under cover if you can; stay weather-aware; phone alerts ON.
Elsewhere	No organized severe weather expected outside the areas above today.	No special action; keep phone alerts ON.
Wildfire - national	Active wildfire season but no major new fire this week. There are 18 large fires being worked nationwide across five states (Florida has the most), with more than 5,000 firefighters assigned.	If you are in a fire-prone area, check InciWeb for any local fire and keep a go-bag ready.
Rest of the country	No active severe-weather signals this week.	No action.

SPACE WEATHER & GPS - Quick Status

Today (Wed 27 May): The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's [Space Weather Prediction Center](#) reports that this week's minor solar radiation storm has ended; only a small

geomagnetic disturbance remains. No effect for most people. Scale reference: [NOAA Space Weather Scales](#).

Household impact: None. Home uses of GPS, phones, and internet work normally. A minor solar radiation storm matters mainly to satellite operators and to airlines flying far-north polar routes. The minor geomagnetic disturbance may make the aurora visible at high latitudes such as Canada and Alaska, but has no effect on homes.

Ham radio + emergency communications operators: Shortwave (HF) radio may have brief static or fade on far-north and over-the-pole paths today. Conditions at mid-latitudes are close to normal.

Looking ahead: Nothing to act on today. If you rely on HF radio, keep an eye on the forecast at [spaceweather.gov](#) in case the storm strengthens.

SUPPLY CHAIN - What It Means at the Store

Gas pump: Easing, around 4.39 dollars per gallon nationally, continuing the post-holiday decline. The US-Iran situation is the main swing factor: if the draft agreement is signed and the Strait of Hormuz reopens to shipping, expect a few cents of decline within a week; if the talks break down, expect prices to climb.

Bread + pasta: Stable. The [US Department of Agriculture](#)'s May report shows an ample wheat supply baseline. The next [USDA](#) crop report is June 11.

Shipping containers: Strait of Hormuz traffic remains far below normal; the US naval blockade is in its second month. A draft US-Iran agreement that would reopen the Strait to shipping is waiting on President Trump to sign, though Iran fired a missile at Kuwait overnight that was shot down. Until a deal is signed, goods routed through the Gulf may continue to see longer transit times and higher insurance costs.

Travel: US-bound flights from the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Uganda, and South Sudan are routed to Washington-Dulles only because of the Ebola outbreak. If you have travel booked from or through the affected region, check with your airline before departure.

CYBER, COMMS & LOCAL IMPACTS

Government computer systems: The Memorial Day holiday weekend was quiet for new cybersecurity bulletins from the US [Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency](#). The current item to act on is a serious flaw in the LiteSpeed cPanel website plugin, which has a federal patch deadline of today, 29 May; a second flaw in Daemon Tools Lite has a 30 May deadline.

Household impact: Low. This is a website-software issue, not a consumer-device one. If your business or home office runs a website on a cPanel host, ask your IT vendor to confirm the LiteSpeed plugin is patched. Keep your home devices (phones, laptops, router firmware) on automatic updates.

NOAA Weather Radio: 31 transmitters affected across 17 states (17 fully out of service, 14 degraded), per a 29 May operator roster. The most relevant to this week's weather are Rio Grande City and Rockport, Texas (both out of service, in or near the storm zone), plus the New Mexico gaps at Carlsbad, Artesia, and Roswell (out of service) under the Southwest fire-weather threat. A cluster of transmitters near Juneau, Alaska is also degraded, but that is well away from this week's severe weather.

Workaround: In affected areas, rely on phone Wireless Emergency Alerts (built into iPhone and Android), the [FEMA App](#), and local broadcast Emergency Alert System (television and AM/FM radio).

SIGNALS THAT CONDITIONS ARE GETTING WORSE

Watch for these in the news this week. If you see them, raise your readiness one notch.

- The Kuwait missile exchange escalating into sustained fighting, or the draft US-Iran agreement breaking down instead of being signed.
- Another strike on a commercial ship in the Persian Gulf or Strait of Hormuz.
- Israel strikes Beirut neighborhoods (the Dahieh district is the bellwether), which would put the Lebanon ceasefire at risk.
- The Storm Prediction Center upgrades the western Texas storm risk to a higher category, or a supercell produces very large hail near a populated area.
- A first US case of Ebola, a new suspected case outside Africa, or the [CDC](#) raising its US risk assessment above low.
- A sharp escalation in the war in Ukraine, beyond the long-range strikes that have become routine.
