PART I — FRAMEWORK REFERENCE

Chapter 1: The PACE Framework and Its Foundations

PACE — Primary, Alternate, Contingency, Emergency — is the military communications planning framework that ensures you always have a way to communicate, even when your first choice fails. It is a systems plan, not a frequency plan: it names entire communications methods and decides in advance which one to use and when to switch.

What PACE Is — and Is Not

PACE IS	PACE IS NOT
A pre-decided, ordered sequence of communications systems	A frequency plan or list of channels within one system
A plan with a different failure mode at every tier	Two frequencies on the same repeater or infrastructure
Documented, distributed, and tested before the emergency	An informal understanding kept in one person's head
Applicable to any domain requiring redundancy	Limited to radio communications alone

THE NON-NEGOTIABLE SEQUENCE

The order of PACE is not a suggestion. Every tier transition requires a specific, observable, pre-agreed trigger — a time window, a number of attempts, or a confirmed observation — that any group member can recognize independently. The trigger eliminates the decision. Under stress, you execute the plan instead of inventing one.

Chapter 2: Tier Definitions and Assignment Criteria

Tier	Role	Key Requirement
P — Primary	Everyday go-to system — highest capability, most familiar	All members trained on it; assumed available under normal conditions
A — Alternate	First backup, activated on a specific trigger	Must have a different failure mode from Primary
C — Contingency	Austere option, minimal infrastructure	No shared infrastructure with Primary or Alternate
E — Emergency	Last resort — must work when all else fails	No shared dependency with any higher tier

The Four Tier-Assignment Criteria

Criterion	Question to Ask
Infrastructure dependence	Does it require cell towers, repeaters, or internet to function?
Power dependence	Does it need grid power, or does it run on battery, solar, or hand-crank?
Range	Does the system's range match the communications relationship it covers?
Skill threshold	Can every member who might need to activate this tier actually operate it?

THE MOST COMMON PLANNING ERROR

A group that lists “Primary: repeater on 146.940, Alternate: backup repeater on 147.315” has not built a PACE plan. Both tiers depend on the same repeater infrastructure. If that site fails, both tiers fail simultaneously. A real Alternate must use a different system with a genuinely different failure mode.

Chapter 3: Communications Systems by Tier

Every system in your group's kit has a specific infrastructure profile, power requirement, range, and licensing requirement. Those characteristics determine which tier it belongs in.

System	Typical Tier	Infrastructure	License	Key Limitation
Cell phone / SMS	Primary	Cell tower + grid	None	First to fail — network overload and infrastructure damage
GMRS handheld	P or A	None (direct)	GMRS (FCC)	Short range; line-of-sight limited by terrain and power
FRS handheld	P or A	None (direct)	None required	2W limit; no repeater access; very short range
VHF/UHF via repeater	Alternate	Repeater site + power	Amateur (Tech+)	Repeater site is single point of failure
VHF/UHF simplex	Contingency	None (direct)	Amateur (Tech+)	Short range only; line-of-sight

HF voice / digital	Contingency	None (HF antenna)	Amateur (General+)	Requires more equipment and operating skill
Satellite (inReach)	Emergency	Satellite only	None (subscription)	Subscription cost; one-to-one; can lapse
Runner / courier	Emergency	None	None	Range limited by human endurance

PACE Plans Are Relationship-Specific

One PACE plan does not cover all your communications. Different relationships require different system stacks because range requirements change everything.

Relationship	Range	PACE Planning Note
Household / immediate team	< 1 mile	FRS or GMRS simplex adequate as Primary; runner viable as Emergency
Neighborhood / block group	1–5 miles	GMRS Primary; repeater Alternate if licensed; simplex Contingency
Regional / county network	10–100 miles	Repeater Primary; HF Contingency; satellite Emergency
Out-of-area / family check-in	100+ miles	Cell Primary; HF or satellite required for all lower tiers

Chapter 4: Failure Triggers, Documentation, and Distribution

A failure trigger is the specific, observable, pre-agreed condition that tells every member to move to the next tier. It must be specific, observable independently, and time-bounded.

Transition	Weak Trigger (avoid)	Strong Trigger (use this)
P → A	“Phone isn’t working”	No cellular signal for 30 minutes AND outbound texts are not delivering
A → C	“Repeater is down”	No response on repeater net after three scheduled check-in windows
C → E	“Nothing is working”	No contact by simplex within 24 hours of last confirmed communication

Documentation and Distribution Checklist

- Written on paper — not only digital storage, because devices fail when you need them
- Laminated card distributed to every member: go-bag, vehicle, and home kit

- Reviewed at every regular group meeting — not filed away between activations
- Updated after every test based on what actually worked

Chapter 5: Testing Every Tier

A tier that has never been tested is a guess, not a tier. Testing is part of the plan, not an optional extra.

Test Type	When	What It Proves
Scheduled monthly test	Rotate through P, A, C, E on a calendar	System works; equipment operational; members know the method
Unannounced drill	Declare “Primary unavailable” without warning	Members identify the trigger and switch without guidance
Full cascade test	Start on Emergency, activate up through all tiers	Every tier and trigger works in sequence
Documentation audit	Quarterly or after any group change	Every card is current; every trigger is still specific

Chapter 6: PACE Beyond Communications

The four-tier framework transfers directly to any planning domain requiring redundancy. The structure, the requirement for different failure modes between tiers, and the test discipline all carry over unchanged.

Domain	P	A	C	E
Evacuation	Main highway	Secondary roads	Off-road track	On foot via trail
Water	Municipal tap	Stored reserves	Rainwater collection	River/stream filtered
Medical Care	Hospital	Group medic + kit	Field improvisation	Buddy care/self-care
Power	Grid electricity	Generator	Solar/battery bank	Manual methods
Leadership	Designated leader	Second-in-command	Senior member present	Most capable present
Food	Store/supply chain	Group stockpile	Foraging/hunting	Reduced calorie protocol

THE INFRASTRUCTURE CHECK — EVERY DOMAIN, SAME QUESTION

If the tier above this one fails for reason X, does this tier also fail for reason X? If yes, they are the same tier in disguise. Rewrite until each tier has a genuinely independent failure mode. This check applies identically whether you are planning communications, power, water, or leadership succession.

PART II — FAILURE MODE CATALOGUE

Chapter 7: Common Failure Modes by Planning Step

The most common errors at each stage of PACE planning — what the knowledge checks in the online lessons are designed to expose.

Stage	Common Failure Mode	Consequence
Why Comms Fail	Assuming Primary will work because it always has	No backup exists; improvisation when Primary fails at the worst moment
Why Comms Fail	“We have a backup repeater” taken as a complete PACE plan	Both tiers share infrastructure; single failure takes both down
The Framework	Confusing a frequency list with a systems plan	Frequencies change; the system choice is the tier, not the channel
The Framework	Assigning a tier but never testing it	A never-tested tier is a guess, not a plan
Systems for PACE	All four tiers use infrastructure-dependent systems	Single infrastructure failure cascades across the entire plan
Systems for PACE	Assuming simplex range without terrain testing	Range unvalidated; Contingency tier fails at the moment of need
Building the Plan	Writing vague failure triggers (“when it stops working”)	No one knows when to switch; group stays on failing Primary
Building the Plan	Plan kept only in the leader's head	Leader unavailable = no one knows the plan; single point of failure
Building the Plan	Cards never distributed to members	Member at point of need cannot execute their tier
Beyond Comms	Applying PACE only to communications	All other critical plans remain single-tier; failures cascade
Beyond Comms	Plan built once and never reviewed	Equipment, membership, and tested triggers go stale
