PART I — QUICK REFERENCE

Chapter 0: Course Introduction: From Reactive Improvisation to Systematic Assessment

Reference for Lesson 0

METT-TC is the Army's mission-analysis framework (FM 2-0) adapted for civilian preparedness: six factors, worked in the same order, every time a decision has to be made under pressure.

It sits alongside two other FFTP frameworks in the same estimate chain: OAKOC (INT-07) goes deep on the Terrain & Weather factor, and MDCOA (INT-06) goes deep on the Enemy/Threats factor.

Framework	Relationship to METT-TC
OAKOC (INT-07)	Expands the Terrain & Weather factor into five sub-elements: Observation/Fields of Fire, Avenues of Approach, Key Terrain, Obstacles, Cover/Concealment.
MDCOA (INT-06)	Expands the Enemy/Threats factor by modeling the worst case an adversary could execute, not just the likely one.

Chapter 1: Mission: Task, Purpose, and End State

Reference for Lesson 1

A mission statement has three parts: the task (what), the purpose (why), and the end state (what “done” looks like).

Specified tasks are stated outright. Implied tasks are necessary but unstated — e.g., “cross the river” implies “find or build a crossing point.”

Element	Key Question
Task	What exactly needs to be accomplished?
Purpose	Why does it matter — what is the intent behind it?
End State	What does success look like when this is over?
Specified/Implied Tasks	What is stated outright, and what is required but unstated?

Chapter 2: Enemy and Threats: Reading Human and Environmental Risk

Reference for Lesson 2

In a non-combat context, “enemy” expands to any threat — hostile people, wildlife, disease, or infrastructure failure.

Most Likely Course of Action (MLCOA) and Most Dangerous Course of Action (MDCOA, INT-06) are evaluated separately — plan for the likely case, but know the worst case.

Threat Type	Examples
Human	Looters, desperate refugees, territorial locals, opportunistic crime
Environmental	Hypothermia, dehydration, flash floods, wildlife, disease vectors
Infrastructure	Grid-down conditions, water contamination, road/bridge failure

Chapter 3: Terrain and Weather: The Physical Environment

Reference for Lesson 3

Terrain is analyzed using OAKOC (full treatment in INT-07): Observation/Fields of Fire, Avenues of Approach, Key Terrain, Obstacles, Cover/Concealment.

Weather effects are evaluated for their operational impact, not just comfort — rain raises rivers and softens trails, cold drives hypothermia risk, heat drives dehydration, wind spreads fire and complicates navigation.

Weather Factor	Operational Effect
Rain	Muddy trails, rising rivers, reduced visibility
Cold	Hypothermia risk, increased caloric/fuel demand
Heat	Dehydration risk, reduced movement pace
Wind	Fire spread, navigation and communication difficulty

Chapter 4: Troops and Support Available: The Honest Inventory

Reference for Lesson 4

Cover personnel (numbers, fitness, skills, morale, medical status), equipment (quality and quantity), and outside support (allies, caches, vehicles, resupply).

An inventory has to be realistic, not aspirational — the plan is built around what the group actually has, not what it wishes it had.

Category	What to Inventory
Personnel	Numbers, fitness level, trained skills, morale, medical conditions
Equipment	Gear quality and quantity — weapons, first aid, water purification, communications
Support	Allies, pre-positioned caches, vehicles, resupply points

Chapter 5: Time Available: The Honest Clock

Reference for Lesson 5

Time available covers planning time, execution time, and hard deadlines — dark, weather arrival, fuel or food limits.

Time-distance factors (pace, rest halts, contingencies) turn a deadline into an actual movement plan, worked backward from the deadline.

Question	Why It Matters
How much time to plan and execute?	Sets how detailed the plan can realistically be
What are the critical deadlines?	Darkness, storm arrival, fuel/food limits all cap your options
What are the time-distance factors?	Pace, rest halts, and contingencies convert a deadline into a route plan

Chapter 6: Civil Considerations and Running the Full Estimate

Reference for Lesson 6

Civil considerations cover who else is in the area (friendly, neutral, hostile), infrastructure status, cultural factors, and refugee flows.

This factor is also where the OPSEC-versus-aid tradeoff lives: helping visible neighbors builds goodwill but can compromise operational security.

Once all six factors are worked, the estimate is scored: does each factor favor you, the threat, or is it neutral — and what does that mean you have to change?

Factor	Score: Advantage?
Mission	Me / Threat / Neutral
Enemy / Threats	Me / Threat / Neutral
Terrain & Weather	Me / Threat / Neutral
Troops & Support Available	Me / Threat / Neutral
Time Available	Me / Threat / Neutral
Civil Considerations	Me / Threat / Neutral

Use this worksheet to run a complete six-factor estimate before a bug-out decision, a wilderness movement, or a MAG operation.

Glossary

Term	Definition
METT-TC	Mission, Enemy, Terrain and Weather, Troops and Support Available, Time Available, Civil Considerations — the Army's mission variables (FM 2-0), adapted here for civilian preparedness.
End State	The condition that defines success — what things look like once the mission is complete.
Specified Task	A task stated outright in the mission.
Implied Task	A task not stated outright but necessary to accomplish a specified task.
MLCOA	Most Likely Course of Action — what a threat will probably do.
MDCOA	Most Dangerous Course of Action — the worst case a threat could execute (full treatment in INT-06).
OAKOC	Observation/Fields of Fire, Avenues of Approach, Key Terrain, Obstacles, Cover/Concealment — the terrain-analysis sub-framework (full treatment in INT-07).
Civil Considerations	The people, infrastructure, and cultural factors present in an area that affect a plan.

Quick Reference Card

The six-factor estimate at a glance.

Factor	Core Question
M — Mission	What is the task, the purpose, and the end state?
E — Enemy / Threats	Who or what threatens this, and what's their worst case (MDCOA)?
T — Terrain & Weather	What does the ground and the sky do to help or hurt (OAKOC)?
T — Troops & Support Available	What do we honestly have — people, gear, outside help?
T — Time Available	How much time, and what's the hard deadline?
C — Civil Considerations	Who else is here, and what's the OPSEC-vs-aid tradeoff?

FM 2-0, Intelligence (2014)	Defines METT-TC as the Army's mission variables; glossary source for the framework's official structure and terminology.
MCRP 3-11.3, Scouting and Patrolling	Documents the historical METT-T patrol leader's estimate — the tactical-level ancestor of the full framework.
FM 34-2-1, Reconnaissance and Surveillance	Collection-planning detail behind the Terrain & Weather and Civil Considerations factors.
FM 2-22.3, HUMINT Collection Operations	Area-assessment doctrine referenced for the Civil Considerations factor.
INT-07, OAKOC	Terrain analysis sub-framework referenced under Terrain & Weather.
INT-06, MDCOA	Most Dangerous Course of Action modeling referenced under Enemy/Threats.

Open Items
