WHAT THIS COURSE IS NOT

SEC-03 is an awareness course. It teaches you to recognize what you're looking at — it does not train you to actively detect or counter surveillance. That operational training is SEC-07: Watching the Watchers — Operations, which this guide references throughout as the next step.

CHAPTER 1: TEAM STRUCTURE AND METHOD

SEC-02 taught your group what it reveals. This chapter covers how the people who might be collecting on that exposure actually organize and move. You cannot recognize surveillance you don't understand.

Why This Course Exists

SEC-02 is the recognition-level baseline for every member: what critical information is, how indicators are created, how to recognize that you might be watched, and what to do about it in the moment.

SEC-03 goes one level deeper without yet asking you to act operationally. If your group later designates you for an active detection or countersurveillance role, SEC-07 (Watching the Watchers: Operations) builds directly on what you learn here.

DOCTRINE NOTE — NOTICE VS. COUNTER

Camp X SOE tradecraft draws a distinction that runs through this entire course: the operator who merely notices a follower has done nothing yet. The operator who can check for surveillance, confirm it, and either shake it or use it has done the job. SEC-03 teaches the first half. SEC-07 teaches the second.

The Team Roles

Role	Function
Eyeball	Direct visual contact on the subject at any given moment. Rotates constantly — sustained proximity gets noticed.
Floater	Positioned ahead, behind, or parallel to the subject, ready to assume eyeball when needed.
Control / Net	Coordinates the team by radio or signal, tracks who has eyeball, directs repositioning.

The Box

A common surveillance formation: team members positioned on multiple sides of the subject — ahead, behind, and at least one flank — rather than strung out in a single line behind them. A subject who only watches their six will miss a team running the box.

The Leap-Frog

Team members alternate who holds eyeball: Team Member A follows for a stretch, then peels off, while Team Member B — already positioned ahead or nearby — assumes the follow. No single person or vehicle stays in view long enough to register as familiar.

WHY THIS MATTERS LATER

This is why the rule of three from SEC-02 matters more than it first appears. A well-run leap-frog defeats casual, single-observation awareness — but not pattern recognition across multiple separate sightings. Repetition is the most dangerous element for the watcher too. SEC-07 builds the surveillance detection route around forcing that vulnerability to show itself.

CHAPTER 2: RECOGNIZING AND UNDERSTANDING THE THREAT

Fixed, Mobile, and Technical Surveillance

Fixed surveillance is a static observation post — a parked vehicle with sightline, a person stationed for an extended period, a vantage point overlooking a location you use. It trades mobility for persistence; it cannot follow you once you leave the area.

Mobile surveillance is a team or individual that moves with you, on foot or by vehicle. This is what the box and leap-frog are built to sustain. It's resource-intensive but follows you wherever you go.

Technical surveillance doesn't require a human being physically present — a vehicle tracker, a camera, a compromised phone, an RF intercept. SEC-07 covers detecting technical collection in depth; COM-03 (COMSEC) and COM-04 (EMCON) cover protecting your own communications and emissions.

FIELD DISTINCTION

Same person/vehicle always in the same place regardless of where you go: fixed. Same person/vehicle appearing at different places you go: mobile. Nothing visible ever repeats but someone keeps showing up who shouldn't know where you'll be: suspect technical.

What They're Looking For

Objective	What It Requires
Pattern of life	Longest observation period; usually fixed surveillance over days or weeks
Associations	Watching for who you meet, where, and how often — often the real target
Confirmation of a suspicion	Brief, targeted observation; can end abruptly once answered
Vulnerability assessment	Security posture, routine, predictable or exposed points

The Surveillance Team's Own Vulnerabilities

A surveillance operation, however well run, is not invisible — it is only harder to see than an amateur effort. This is the foundation SEC-07 is built on.

Vulnerability	Why It Exists
Repetition	Finite people, vehicles, and cover identities — the same faces and vehicles eventually reappear.
Choke points	A route with few natural bottlenecks forces the team to be visible at a point you control.
Reaction to the unexpected	A sudden change in your behavior forces a real-time decision the team would rather not make.
Communication signature	Coordinating a leap-frog or box requires communication, which is itself detectable and creates synchronized, patterned behavior.

DOCTRINE NOTE — CAMP X SOE CHECKS

Walk up a comparatively empty street and see who follows; cross the street and see who does likewise; enter and leave a shop and note who lingers outside. Each is a deliberate, low-risk action forcing a genuine surveillance element to make a choice it would rather not make. SEC-07 formalizes this into a designed surveillance detection route.

What's Next

SEC-03 ends at understanding. It does not train you to actively detect surveillance, run a countersurveillance operation, or report findings in an operational format — that is SEC-07: Watching the Watchers — Operations.

SEC-07 covers:

- Designing and running a surveillance detection route (SDR)
- Building a pattern-of-life baseline and reading contrasts against it
- Civilian observation post practice and SALUTE reporting
- Countersurveillance team roles, communication, and abort criteria
- Technical surveillance awareness — detecting RF, tracker, and camera collection
- Reporting, decision-making, and escalation criteria

PREREQUISITES FOR SEC-07

SEC-02 and SEC-03 must both be complete. SEC-07 assumes the team-structure and threat-recognition knowledge in this guide as a starting point — it does not re-teach it.
